The one who treated him with mercy.

Jesus' listeners must have been surprised by this parable. Jews looked down on Samaritans, but in this story, it is the Samaritan, not the priest or the Levite, who treats the injured man with mercy. The Samaritan is the one who loves his neighbour and takes care of him.

Jesus' message is clear: "Go and do likewise". But the Church Fathers saw this parable as more than an example of how we should love our neighbour. They saw Jesus as the good Samaritan, the One who has come to care for each of us who have been battered by sin and the powers of evil. He is the One who finds us lying "half dead" by the side of the road. And he is the One who bandages our wounds and carries us to the "inn," the Church.

This allegorical reading can deepen our understanding of this very familiar parable. Through Jesus' death and resurrection, he has healed us of the wounds of our sin. Now recovered and sustained by the Church's sacraments, we can be the good Samaritans who join the Lord in caring for those people who are still on the side of the road and in need of rescue. And because we are fellow travellers who know what it's like to be wounded by sin and rescued by the Lord, we can show them the same mercy that we have received.

Jesus' parable is a call to extend ourselves to the many people in the world today who are hurting and in need of help. No doubt it's challenging. But remembering what the Lord has done for us can move us to become more generous and compassionate, just like the good Samaritan in the parable.

Today at Mass, thank the Lord for having treated you with so much mercy. Then ask him to show you how to be a good Samaritan to someone who needs your love, compassion, and
