St Raphael's Parish 17 Hardy St, Preston West Wednesdays 1.30pm Contact: Marijana Jurjevic 0422 340 675 How are our good deeds like a shining light? And why do they bring glory to God? A key to understanding Jesus' words lies in today's first reading from Isaiah.

The reading describes what have come to be called the corporal works of mercy: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, sheltering the homeless, giving to the poor (Is 58:7, 10). By performing these works, we imitate our heavenly Father, whose mercy knows no bounds. So when people see these "good deeds" (5:16), they see how God loves them: with generosity, mercy, and faithfulness. We believe that God himself reaches out to people through our actions. He is helping us display a "family likeness" to him, and it points anyone who sees us back to him.

In a broader way, our works of mercy can also contribute toward the kind of society that reflects God's priorities. How? The mercy we show people changes our own hearts. We see other people as beloved children of God, and that affects the way we act. And people notice. When, for instance, we sacrifice a night out so that we can give time or money to the needy, our corner of the world begins to look a little more like God's kingdom. When his generosity starts to overcome our selfishness or materialism, we help the people around us see that something different, something better, is possible. And, as Isaiah says, our "light shall break forth like the dawn" (58:8).

What concrete ways can God show his mercy through you? Start at your parish. It likely has programs to serve the poor or reach out to those in need. Maybe you could work at a homeless shelter or even start an out- reach like serving lunches at a soup kitchen. Get involved, and let the light of God's likeness shine forth. wau.org

Jesus once said, mincing no words: "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me."

This is exactly what Matthew did: he rose and followed him! In this "he rose," it is legitimate to read detachment from a sinful situation and at the same time, a conscious attachment to a new, upright life in communion with Jesus.

Lastly, let us remember that the tradition of the ancient Church agrees in attributing to Matthew the paternity of the First Gospel. This had already begun with Bishop Papias of Hierapolis in Frisia, in about the year 130.

He writes: "Matthew set down the words (of the Lord) in the Hebrew tongue and everyone interpreted them as best he could."

Eusebius, the historian, adds this piece of information: "When Matthew, who had first preached among the Jews, decided also to reach out to other peoples, he wrote down the Gospel he preached in his mother tongue; thus, he sought to put in writing, for those whom he was leaving, what they would be losing with his departure."

The Gospel of Matthew written in Hebrew or Aramaic is no longer extant, but in the Greek Gospel that we possess we still continue to hear, in a certain way, the persuasive voice of the publican Matthew, who, having become an Apostle, continues to proclaim God's saving mercy to us. And let us listen to St. Matthew's message, meditating upon it ever anew also to learn to stand up and follow Jesus with determination.

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST MATTHEW I

The Gospel according to St Matthew is the first book in the New Testament.

A good case can be made from ancient tradition and from the language and ideas in the Gospel that it is early and indeed the first of the four Gospels. If we locate it at AD 43. it would have been composed

about ten years after the death and Resurrection of Jesus.

Ancient Christian tradition tells us that the author was St. Matthew, one of the apostles (also called Levi). The text itself shows us that the book was written by a Jewish Christian for Jewish Christians. The original language was Aramaic, the language that Jesus and his disciples spoke in Palestine at the time. At an early date it was translated into Koine Greek, the language in which it has come down to us. The Aramaic original has not been preserved.

Matthew's theme is that Jesus was the Messiah whom the Jews were looking for; the leaders of the people recognized him but rejected him and so cut themselves off from the Messianic Kingdom. Jesus did not come to destroy the Law but to fulfil it; this notion of fulfilment runs through the whole Gospel. Jesus is also presented as the Saviour of the world, the Son of God, the Son of David, and the New Moses; he is Emmanuel, or Godwith-us, now and until the end of the world in his Church.
